IHSAA "LEGENDS OF THE GAME"

The Idaho High School Activities Association is pleased to announce the 2011 "Legends of the Game" recipients. The award was established in 2001 to help preserve the heritage of Idaho high school sports by honoring great teams of the past. Eligible basketball "Legends" include girls' teams from at least 20 years ago and boys' teams from at least 30 years ago. Ceremonies honoring "Legends" recipients will take place during halftime of the state 5A basketball championship games at the Idaho Center. The girls' ceremony is slated for February 19 and the boys' ceremony will take place on March 5.

Girls' Basketball – Highland (Craigmont) – 1978: Highland of Craigmont's girls basketball team, under the direction of Coach Dave Snodgrass, is the tenth recipient of the IHSAA girls "Legends of the Game" award. Not only were the 1978 Huskies state champions, they went 22-1 that season, losing only to the eventual A-3 state champion Prairie Pirates. Their average margin of victory was 22 points. Over an eleven-year period, Highland of Craigmont's girls basketball program won eight league championships and two state championships.

Boys' Basketball – Lewiston – 1948: Lewiston High School's 1948 basketball team has been chosen as the eleventh IHSAA boys "Legends of the Game". Under the direction of coach Wesley Lathen, this talented group of young men finished their season with a record of 25-2 on their way to the state title. With no "superstars" to speak of, the Lewiston High School team played magnificently together, ending Lewiston's state championship drought of 22 years and renewing a great basketball tradition in the Lewiston community.

2011 HALL OF FAME SELECTION PROCESS UNDERWAY

The nomination deadline for the Hall of Fame Class of 2011 was November 15. New nominees are being notified by the IHSAA and applications are due January 4, 2011.

The Hall of Fame is an opportunity to honor individuals who through distinguished service to IHSAA sponsored activity programs help preserve the heritage of high school activities, strengthen sportsmanship, and enhance the values derived from participation.

Hall of Fame Eligibility Requirements

Nominees shall include individuals who through significant, long-term contributions and distinguished achievement have excelled in one or more high school activity sponsored by the IHSAA. These individuals may include the following:

Nominees (a) (b) (c) shall have served for at least twenty-five years, with at least 20 of those being in Idaho. Nominees (f) must have been graduated from high school for at least twenty-five years.

Nominations for 2011 Memorial Awards are due in the IHSAA office by January 15, 2011 and applications are due by March 15, 2011.

Dick Fleischmann Memorial Award (est. 1986) This award honors an individual who has conducted numerous IHSAA tournaments or festivals.

Wes Lowe Memorial Award (est. 1986) This award honors an individual who has placed youth development above his or her personal gain

Duane D. Wolfe Memorial Award (est. 1993) This award honors long time high school activities' benefactors/supporters from outside the educational community.

Distinguished Service Awards

Each of the six activity district Boards of Control submit (by March 15) the name of one individual who has performed meritorious service to their district.

WINTER SPORTS ELIGIBILITY VERIFICATION DUE FEBRUARY 1

The winter sports eligibility verification forms can be downloaded from the IHSAA web site, www.idhsaa.org. Each school principal is reminded to certify the eligibility of all students who are competing in IHSAA sanctioned winter sports. The eligibility verification form is to be returned to the IHSAA by February 1, 2010.

ATTENTION: POSSIBLE VIOLATIONS

Administrators and athletic directors, please take every measure to inform your coaches and athletes of non-school participation Rule 8-11-1, contest Rule 5-4, and Rule 8-12-1, practice before contests. Every year we have athletes declared ineligible because of violating these rules.

Rule 8-11-1 prohibits the in-season athlete from participating in outside athletic contests such as playing on a church or community basketball team or competing in an open wrestling tournament.

Rule 5-12 prohibits an organized scrimmage or practice of a high school team with or against non high school teams or players. Example: Alumni and church basketball teams or players.

Rule 8-12-2 requires that wrestling participants must have ten days of practice **in that sport**. The day of the first scheduled contest shall not be allowed to count as one of the ten days in meeting the ten-day practice rule.

WRESTLING SCHEDULING LIMITATIONS

Administrators, please remind coaches of the wrestling scheduling limitations. The limitations are as follows: No team (any level) or individual may wrestle more than 15 dates during the regular season. A team or individual can compete in a maximum of five tournaments. A tournament is defined as competing against three or more schools. Schools that enter JV or frosh teams in a tournament must so designate prior to the start of the tournament. When a wrestler competes in a dual match tournament, the competition is counted as a tournament even if the individual only wrestles one match. Friday after 3:00 p.m. and Saturday competition may be counted as one date and one tournament. A two-day tournament starting prior to 3:00 p.m. on Friday counts as two of the sixteen dates, but only one tournament. All other competition shall be counted separately. Each day of competition will count as one of the sixteen dates. A team may substitute one additional one-date tournament for two dates. A school wrestling in six one-date tournaments may only wrestle on 15 dates. A team or individual may compete in a maximum of eight tri-matches, where a school competes against only two other schools.

A contestant who exceeds the limitations of regular season participation will become ineligible for district, state, or any other additional IHSAA sponsored competition of that sport.

INTERSCHOLASTIC STAR STUDENT RECOGNITION SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

BE A SPORT! BE A STAR!

The Idaho High School Activities Association Interscholastic Star Student Recognition Scholarship Award (est. 1992) is given to high school juniors whose participation in IHSAA sponsored sports and activities helps promote sportsmanship, teamwork, and support of the school and community. The award is co-sponsored by the United Dairymen of Idaho.

CRITERIA: Applicant must be a junior who has participated in at least one IHSAA sponsored non-athletic and one athletic activity. Applicants must be good citizens and role models for his/her peers. Superior achievement in athletics/activities is not a criteria for this award.

APPLICATION PROCESS: Applications must be submitted by the school principal no later than April 1, 2011. Applications are available from the IHSAA office or can be downloaded from the IHSAA web site, www.idhsaa.org. 5A and 4A schools may submit four applications; 3A and 2A schools may submit three applications; 1A schools may submit two applications.

SELECTION: Screening committees will select semi-finalists and finalists. Final selection will be based upon a telephone interview with each finalist in early May.

AWARDS: Five Interscholastic Star award recipients will be awarded \$1000 scholarships to the college of his/her choice. One recipient will be invited to speak at the annual Hall of Fame Banquet in August. Portions of their application essays will be published in IHSAA bulletins and other publications.

Finalists will receive engraved medallions. Semi-finalists and all school nominees will receive certificates to acknowledge their accomplishments.

Energy Drinks Pose Health Concerns for Athletes

Mathias Claw was still in grade school when he said he started pouring down a popular "energy drink" before his basketball games. He said it would give him "a little amp." The energy boost it gave him on the court became addicting. The 5-foot-9 senior point guard continued drinking them throughout his Chinle High career, capping it in March with the Wildcats' first state final appearance.

On April 20, a day after leading a team of mostly Chinle players to victory in a men's Navajo reservation tournament, the thrill ride ended. He got the wake-up call of his life. Claw collapsed while visiting a dying relative in a hospital. At one point on the flight to the Arizona Heart Institute in Phoenix, it was touch and go. He spent four nights in the hospital undergoing tests, before being released and getting back on the court for six games in two days in a 76-team tournament in Albuquerque.

The family said doctors told them the episode likely was partly triggered by his excessive consumption of the caffeine-and-sugar-loaded energy drink. Claw said he figured he drank seven or eight Red Bulls on an empty stomach during a two-hour break between games the night before. Coming down fast from all of the caffeine, coupled by eating poorly or not at all, running non-stop in tournaments every weekend since the high school season ended, and the shock of seeing an uncle on the brink of death, all hit him. His heart rate became alarmingly low. "It kind of scared me," Claw said. "I've never been scared like that before."

Since then, Claw said his mother, April, cut him off from the drinks; his grandfather Wayne Claw, part of the Chinle school board, put in a policy to ban energy drinks on campus; and Athletic Director Tot Workman asked Claw to speak to elementary-school and junior-high kids about the dangers of stimulant drinks. "You become too dependent on it," Wayne Claw said. "That's what he was doing."

Red Bull has been sold in the United States since the late 1990s, generating copy cats. Red Bull and Monster Energy are most popular and are sold at almost every store. Studies have shown improved cognitive and mental performance. But with excess can come harm. There are 80 milligrams of caffeine in an 8-ounce can of Red Bull, which also contains the amino acid taurine. One of the adverse side effects from consuming high amounts of caffeine is abnormal heart rhythms, which is what happened to Claw, who is now on medication.

Dr. Roger McCoy, a team doctor for the Diamondbacks, Arizona State, and Phoenix Desert Vista and Phoenix Mountain Pointe high schools, said he warns athletes against consuming energy drinks. He said a 2009 study involving people, ages 29 to 39, stopping all caffeine intake for two days then drinking two cans of an energy drink for two days showed an increase of average heart rate by 11 percent and an increase in blood pressure by nearly 10 percent. No EKG changes occurred, he said. "If you take individuals who might have minor cardiovascular issues and don't know about it, and they take energy drinks, you're putting them at risk with just mild exercise," McCoy said.

Red Bull spokeswoman Patrice Radden wrote in an e-mail that plenty of water should be consumed with Red Bull when engaging in physical activities. She equates Red Bull to coffee and, through research, believes a warning label is not necessary, nor is it required. In 2008, more than 4 billion cans of Red Bull were sold worldwide. "We are confident in the safety of our product," Radden said.

There are no interscholastic bylaws against consuming these energy drinks. The Arizona Interscholastic Association is trying to get the message out in its Victory with Honor crusade to educate parents and kids about the potential dangers. "It's mandated in our bylaws to try to support and promote the efforts in letting the student-athletes know the dangers of using those drinks, especially when it gets hot," AIA assistant director Chuck Schmidt said. "Parents need to be aware of the dangers."

Luke Neal, who trains elementary, high school and college athletes in Ahwatukee, calls it "liquid crack," and won't let his son Davonte, a freshman football player and track athlete at Laveen Cesar Chavez, consume even a Pepsi. Claw says he won't take another chance. "I'm done with it," he said.
